INTRODUCTION

In this session we will investigate the concept of salvation and answer the key questions, before moving on to tackle an exam style question.

The dictionary definition of salvation is 'being saved from danger, loss or harm'.

What's that got to do with Christianity? Quite a lot, actually. In fact, salvation is central to the Christian faith. Until you understand salvation you cannot hope to understand Christianity. Here goes...

CONSIDER

1. Have you ever watched a film or TV programme where someone does something stupid and ends up in trouble? Then someone else comes along, the 'saviour', and, well...saves them. Sometimes this is at great expense to themselves – they sacrifice a treasured object, a dream or even their life to save that person. And we all feel sad because that person didn't deserve it. They didn't do the stupid thing that got the other person into trouble. So annoying...

Well, that's a bit like salvation for Christians. Only in this story, we're the person who does something stupid and gets into trouble. So, who is going to save us? The answer is Jesus.

BREAK IT DOWN...

God hates sin. There are consequences to sin: we become separated from God. We've all sinned, therefore, we are all separated from God. God didn't want this to happen, so he sent Jesus to save us from thisseparation.

To get your head around this we need to rewind to the Old Testament days. The people would make sacrifices as an atonement for their sins, The 'something stupid' = sin

The 'trouble' = separation from God

The 'saviour' = Jesus, who hadn't done anything wrong

to make amends for all the bad stuff they'd done. This would bring them back into a relationship with God again.

But they would go back to sinning again and again. God got fed up with this and, as He loved us so much and wanted to be close to us, He sent Jesus as the ultimate sacrifice. No one need make sacrifices ever again. It was done. Finished. All we have to do is repent – say sorry for our sins – and ta-dah! We're close to God again.


